



Pan-American Exposition

For Juniors, Cadettes, Seniors and Ambassadors Girl Scouts of Western New York

Purpose: To increase public and Girl Scout awareness of the 1901 Pan-American Exposition and its role in shaping Buffalo history.

Junior Girl Scouts: Complete 7 requirements including 1 - 3 Cadette/Senior/Ambassador Girl Scouts: Complete 9 requirements including 1 – 3

- 1. Learn about the Pan-American Exposition:
 - When was the Pan-American Exposition (the Pan-AM) held?
 - What was the purpose of the Pan-Am?
 - Was it a success?
 - Why was the Pan-Am called "The Rainbow City?"
 - How were the Exposition grounds illuminated at night?
 - What happened to the Exposition grounds after the Pan-Am ended?
- 2. Learn about the architecture of the Pan-American Exposition:
 - Pick any one of the buildings of the Pan-Am and tell who designed it (You may also choose one of the Midway attractions.)
 - What was the building used for?
 - What were most of the Pan-Am buildings made of?
 - What happened to the building after the Pan-Am?
- 3. Learn about the role of women at the Pan-Am:
 - What roles did women fill at the Pan-Am?
 - How did this differ from previous World Fairs?
 - Share what you learn with your troop.

6. Create a model or draw a picture the building you studied OR write a brief biography of the building's architect.

7. Visit the <u>Theodore Roosevelt Inaugural Site</u> in Buffalo, in person or virtually. <u>https://www.trsite.org/</u>

8. In 1901, advertising was done through print (posters and postcards). Imagine a new Pan-Am is being held in Buffalo. Design a print, radio, or television advertisement for the new Pan-Am.

9. What new inventions and products were highlighted at the Pan-Am? Which of those inventions and products are still in use today?

10. The Pan-Am had its own flag. What symbols decorated the flag? Design your own flag for an event.

11. Imagine you are on the planning committee for a new Pan-American Exposition. What would you choose as your theme? What sort of exhibits would you include?

12. How were different ethnicities/nationalities exhibited at the Pan-Am? Why would the exhibits be different today? How would modern exhibits differ? Were any of the ethnological exhibits truly representative of the population they highlighted?

13. Choose a famous person who visited the Pan-Am and read a biography of that individual's life.

14. Write a short story that takes place at the Pan-Am.

15. Who are John Milburn, William McKinley, Theodore Roosevelt, Leon Czolgosz and James Benjamin Parker? How are they each connected to the Pan-Am?

16. Older Cadettes/Seniors: Read Lauren Belfer's "City of Light". How does Belfer's portrayal of the Pan-Am match reality? How does it differ?
